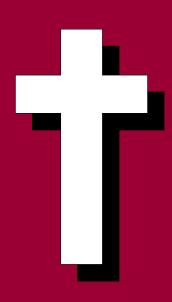

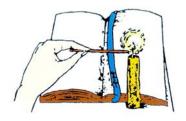

SCHOOL COUNCILS

Alberta Education recognizes the right of parents to be involved in their children's education and for parents, community members and school staff to be involved in key decisions about the education of students. It is not the intent of this policy to restate the School Act, Department of Education Regulations or policy, but to provide guidelines for School Councils in addition to those documents.

The Board believes that a School Council is a means to facilitate collaboration among all education partners in the local school. The Board supports the establishment of a School Council at each school in the Division in accordance with the requirements of the School Act and provincial regulations. School Councils are advisory in nature and will have a role in advising and consulting with the principal on any matter relating to the school.

Specifically,

- The mission statement of the Division identifies a distinctive vision and purpose of schooling that is built upon the values of the Catholic faith. The Board views that School Councils are important partners in ensuring these values are fostered in the daily routines and extra-curricular programs. School Councils assist by encouraging families to take active interest in the programs offered by their school.
- All parents of students in school shall be eligible for membership in the School Council.
- School Councils are advocates for the Catholic school community and are encouraged to maintain a liaison with the Board. The Board recognizes the Medicine Hat Catholic Schools Parent Association as an additional means to provide information to School Councils and to receive advice from School Councils.
- 4. The Board shall provide any School Council the right to address the Board on any issue at the request of the School Council Chair. The School Council may make a presentation at any regularly scheduled meeting of the Board, provided adequate notice is given (at least five (5) working days prior to and not including the date of the meeting).
- 5. Pursuant to their role, School Councils do not deliberate specific or individual personnel or student issues.
- 6. Each School Council shall submit to the Board by October 15 of each year, for the preceding school year, copies of:
 - 6.1 Financial statements of any money handled by the School Council;

- 6.2 A report outlining the activities of the School Council; and
- 6.3 Minutes of each meeting.
- 7. The Board encourages School Councils to contribute, through the principal, to newsletters and the annual report by submitting articles outlining:

Significant accomplishments at the school;

Major events or projects at the school; and

Results of studies undertaken.

8. The Board encourages School Councils to develop school policies which address school issues and which may further elaborate on any Board policy. To make policies meaningful, before any school policy is implemented, the School Council shall:

Ensure that the school community has been given the opportunity to have input into the policy prior to implementation (e.g. first, second and third reading similar to Board policy development);

Ensure that the policy has been voted upon and passed by a majority of School Council members and that the minutes have recorded the motion and the vote;

That when passed, the school community is adequately informed through school newsletters, School Council newsletters, or other accepted means of communication at the school level (e.g. web page) of the policy and implications for students and parents.

Any policies developed by School Councils will be sent to the Board for information.

9. The Board may request the Minister to dissolve a School Council if the Minister is of the opinion that the School Council is not carrying out its responsibilities. The Board may request the Minister to dissolve a School Council if one of the following negative conditions prevail:

Fraudulent, criminal or unethical behavior;

Internal dissension affecting morale;

Adversarial relationships with staff;

Refusal to follow the policies of the Board or to carry out its responsibilities in accordance with the School Act and Alberta Education Regulations;

Disruption of the educational climate; or

Unresolved disputes between the School Council and the principal.

10. The Board requires the principal to take all reasonable steps to establish an advisory committee for the school if the School Council is dissolved, suspended

or if establishment is unsuccessful, in accordance with Alberta Education Regulations.

- 10.1 Membership of the advisory committee shall include:
 - 10.1.1 The Superintendent
 - 10.1.2 A parent
 - 10.1.3 A teacher in the school
- 10.2 The principal, in consultation with the advisory committee, shall establish:
 - 10.2.1 Meeting dates and locations;
 - 10.2.2 Meeting procedures; and
 - 10.2.3 Officers
- 10.3 The advisory committee shall assume duties and functions delegated by the Board to School Councils for the remainder of the school year.
- 11. The Board will provide meeting space in the Board Office for the Medicine Hat Catholic Schools Parent Association whenever requested to do so.
- 12. Conflict Resolution and Appeal Procedures
 - 12.1 Most disputes can be resolved through open and frank discussion and a clear understanding of roles and responsibilities. The first step in any dispute is for the participants to identify the specific areas of concern and then to attempt to resolve them.
 - 12.2 The communication and conflict resolution channel shall be:
 - School Council > Principal > Superintendent > Board.
 - 12.3 When the need to hear an appeal arises, the Board shall establish a hearing date, time, and place which allows the parties to the appeal sufficient notice to prepare for the appeal.
 - 12.4 The appeal shall be heard by the Board. The Superintendent and/or designate(s) may be present to assist the Board, except in cases when it is their decision that is being appealed. In that circumstance, they shall attend to make representation to support their position.
 - 12.5 The School Council Chair and the principal will be given an opportunity to review their positions regarding the dispute and the issues surrounding the dispute. The party making application for appeal shall proceed first and be given a full and ample opportunity to raise concerns before the Board. The other party shall then be given ample opportunity to explain the party's position to the Board. The other party shall then be given ample opportunity to explain the party's position to the Board regarding the disputed matter.
 - 12.6 In the event that the Superintendent has been asked by the parties to the appeal to give a decision with respect to the disputed matter, the Superintendent shall be entitled to make representations regarding his findings and his recommendation as to resolution of the dispute to the Board.

- 12.7 Each party to the dispute shall be given ample opportunity to respond both to the concerns raised by themselves with respect to the dispute, and the Superintendent's proposed resolution of the dispute. Board members and the Superintendent or designate(s) may question the parties to clarify the facts.
- 12.8 The Board will discuss the matter in the absence of the parties and the Superintendent or designate(s).
- 12.9 The Board will make a decision in respect of the appeal and advise the parties in writing regarding the decision and the reasons for that decision. The Board decision shall be considered final.
- 13. As an alternate to conflict resolution and appeal procedures 12 above, third party mediation is also acceptable. The mediator shall be chosen by mutual agreement of the parties to the dispute. Costs for mediation shall be borne by the school.
- 14. At the beginning of each school year, during a regular meeting, each school council will review its by-laws and constitution.
- 15. The principal of each school will ensure that the school council by-laws and constitution are available via a link on the school website.

Background

Honorable David Hancock has indicated that amendments to the School Act will be introduced during the spring sitting of the Alberta legislature.

Recommendations

- 1. The Board of Trustees solicits both the Alberta Catholic School Trustee Association (ACSTA) and the Alberta School Board Association (ASBA) to prepare briefing and discussion materials to help boards review the many complex issues that may be up for discussion in the amendment of the School Act.
- 2. The Board of Trustees requests the ACSTA and the ASBA to hold special meetings with at least Board Chairs and Superintendents to review the School Act and to discuss possible changes.
- 3. The Board of Trustees spends time at its September 29, 2009, meeting discussing the amending of the School Act.
- 4. The Board of Trustees places School Act amendments on the agenda for the November meeting with MLA's.
- 5. The Board of Trustees directs senior administration to bring forward to the November board meeting their synopsis of potential issues related to the amendment of the School Act.

To: School Board Chairs - Public, Separate, Francophone, Charter

As you know, we are preparing for the possible introduction of a replacement for the current *School Act* in the spring sitting of the Legislative Assembly. I would like to invite your board's input as we prepare this new legislation.

The new legislation is intended to be an enabling, overarching framework for the broad governance structures of the education system. As such, I do not expect it to be prescriptive or restrictive except where deemed absolutely necessary. Many of the rules in the current legislation may properly belong in regulation, on which there will be further consultation once the new legislation is passed.

In addition to seeking the views of Alberta's school boards, I am also convening an informal stakeholder committee to make recommendations and highlight common desires and differences about the content of this new legislation. We must continue to focus on our common interests and desires, and seek to understand and clarify issues where each of us differs.

These opportunities for input complement the work being done through the *Inspiring Education* process. It is essential that the new legislation aligns with the long-term vision and frameworks for policy and governance being developed through *Inspiring Education*.

Given the short timelines needed to prepare legislation for the spring, I would like to receive any views you may wish to offer by October 30. While I understand this is a short timeline, particularly at a busy time for all of us, my intention to introduce new legislation has been well known for over a year, and I am sure you have already put considerable thought into what you believe needs to be in the new Act.

While I encourage you to submit your views, all input, including the report of the stakeholder committee, will be made public.

Budget 2010 Discussion Document

Introduction to the Budget 2010 Discussion Document

On August 26, 2009, the Government of Alberta released the first quarter fiscal update, which indicates that Budget 2009 will be the first deficit budget posted by this government in 15 years. Within this context, we are beginning to prepare for Budget 2010, and unlike the traditional budget process, we are inviting school jurisdictions to come to the table to assist us in the process.

In early September, Minister Dave Hancock held a series of meetings with School Board Chairs and Superintendents to initiate work on Budget 2010. The next step will see Michael Walter, Assistant Deputy Minister, Strategic Services Division, lead a series of meetings involving Superintendents, Secretary/Treasurers and Education staff in developing ideas for how our budget could be structured for 2010/2011 and beyond.

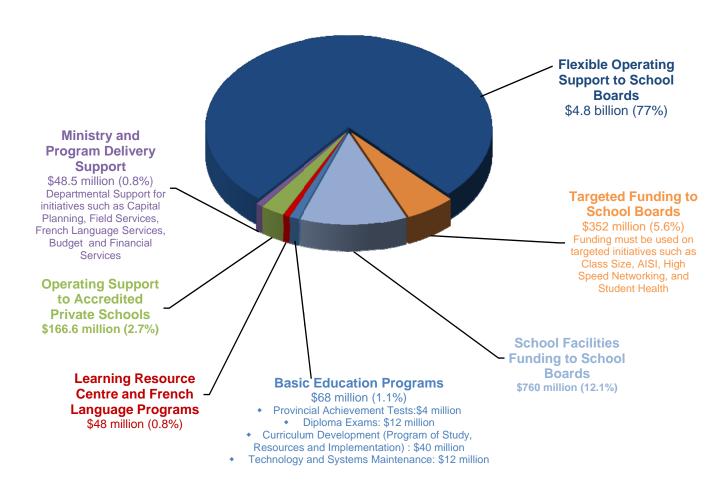
This November, the Minister will once again bring Board Chairs and Education Stakeholders together to share in a discussion that will consider all the ideas and feedback collected through September and October. The result will be a thoughtful, creative approach to budgeting that will allow us to meet our fiscal challenges, while ensuring we maintain the excellence of our education system.

The decisions that will be made over the coming months could have a significant impact on our education system, so we require innovative and creative minds at the table. This discussion document has been designed to help Superintendents and Secretary/Treasurers engage in informed conversations about how the 2010 Value Review will affect Alberta's Education System. Please take the time to review this document in anticipation of the zone meetings, and come prepared to contribute and share your ideas for how we can meet the fiscal challenges ahead.



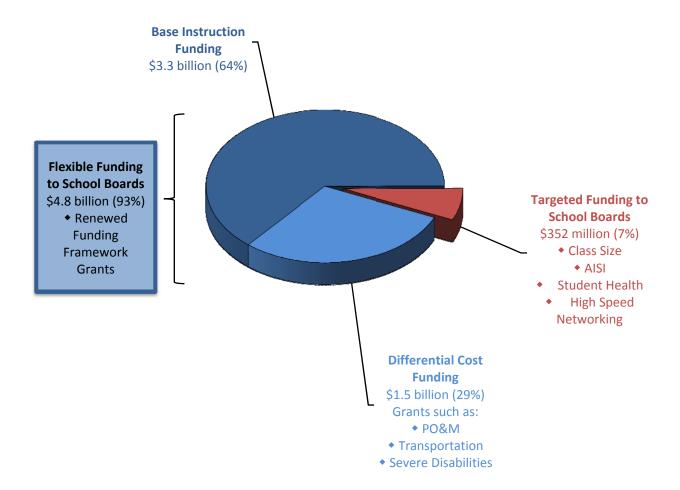
Alberta Education 2009/2010 Fiscal Year Breakdown - \$6.2 Billion

Flexible Funding to School Boards – funding is provided as an allocation method within the Funding Framework model; school boards have maximum flexibility in determining how these funds should be spent to best address local needs.

- **Base Instruction Grant** funding provided on a per-student basis for students in ECS to Grade 9, and on a Credit Enrolment Unit (CEU) basis for students in Grade 10 to 12. One per cent of base instruction is equal to approximately \$32 million.
- **Differential Cost Grants** funding based on distribution formulas designed to address variable cost factors. One per cent of other grants is equal to approximately \$17 million.

Targeted Funding to School Boards – funding is provided for specific initiatives; school boards are required to use these funds on the initiative for which it is provided. One per cent of targeted funding is equal to approximately \$3 million.



Alberta's Funding Framework for K-12 Education

The funding framework for K-12 education in Alberta is based on three pillars:

- Funding,
- Flexibility and
- Accountability.

Pillars of the Funding Framework

Funding

- The Framework is a collection of approximately 25 different grants.
- The Framework is simply a method to distribute funding to School Authorities in a consistent and equitable manner.

Flexibility

- 93% of funding is flexible, meaning school authorities have discretion to use these funds to meet the needs of their students.
- Only a few of the grants are "targeted" and must be used for the purpose for which it was provided.
- Government does not direct how funding is to be used.

Accountability

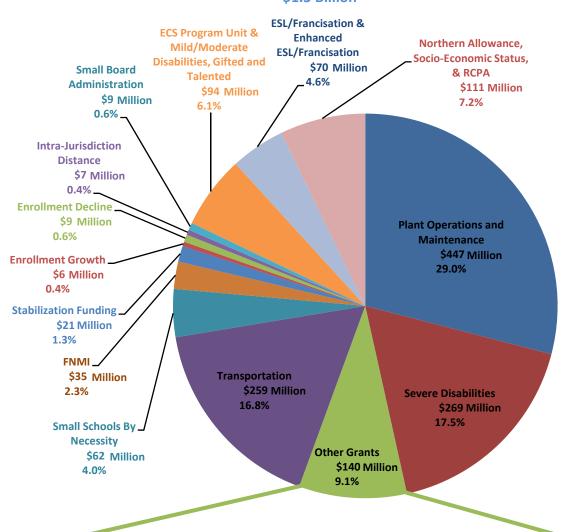
Emphasis is on:

- Measuring achievement and improvement.
- Using results to improve programs for students.

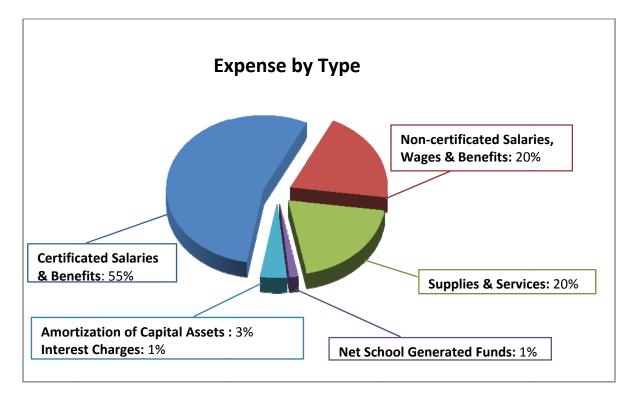

How School Boards Spend Their Money

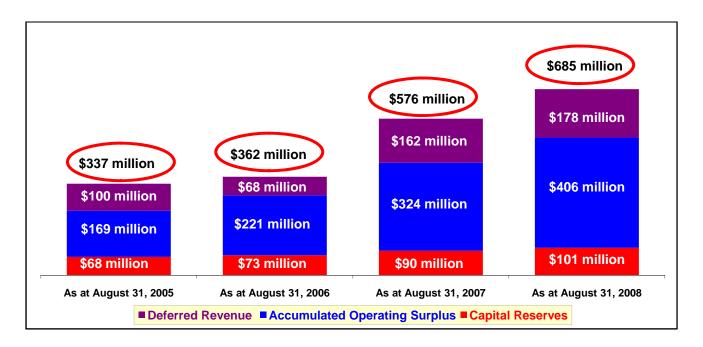

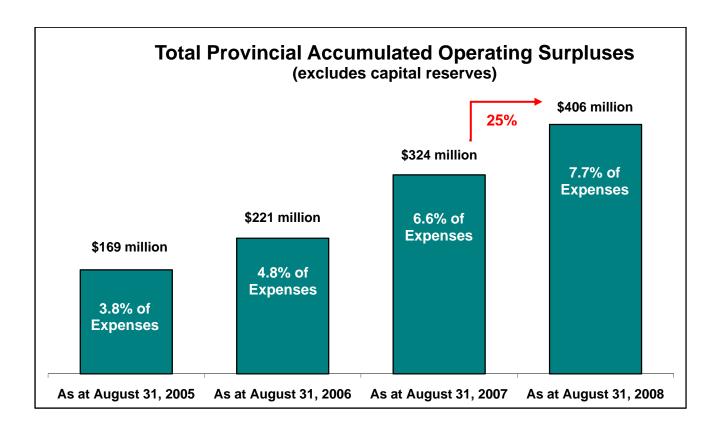




Financial Health of School Jurisdictions

Based on 2007/2008 Audited Financial Statement



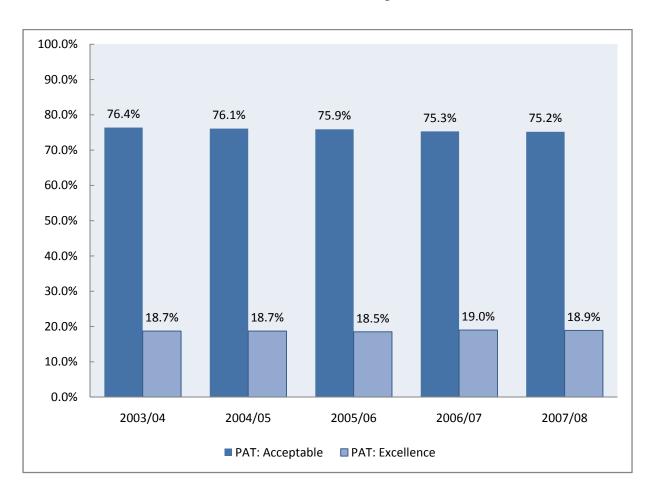




Overall Provincial Achievement Test Results

(the 2008/2009 results will be available in late September)

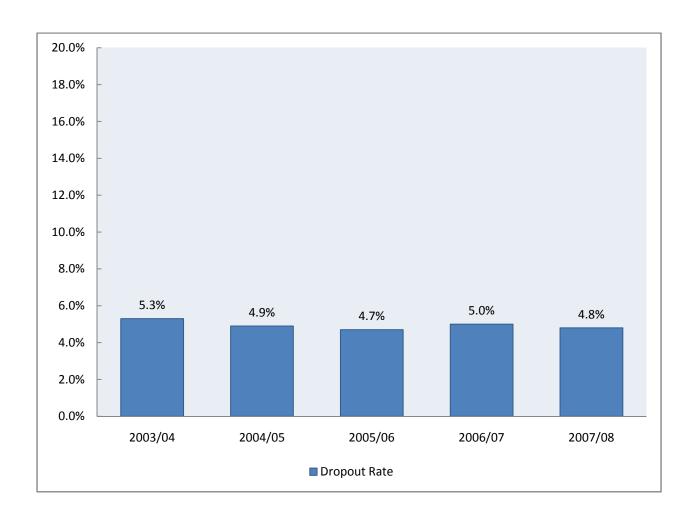


Observations:

- Provincial Achievement Tests are based on the Alberta programs of study. Test results tell us whether students have the foundational knowledge and skills for future learning and success.
- Provincial Achievement Test results at the acceptable level have declined over time.
- Results at the excellence level have been relatively constant over time.
- Students who have not achieved the acceptable standard on Grade 9 Provincial Achievement Tests are unlikely to have the knowledge and skills for success in high school.

Observations:

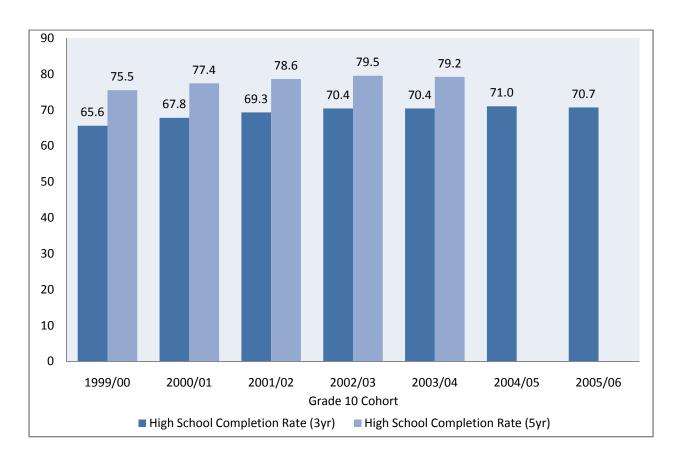
- Provincial dropout rates have declined over time.
- The increase in dropout rates in 2006/2007 likely was related to the economic environment at the time.
- About 20 per cent of students return to school one year after dropping out.

Observations:

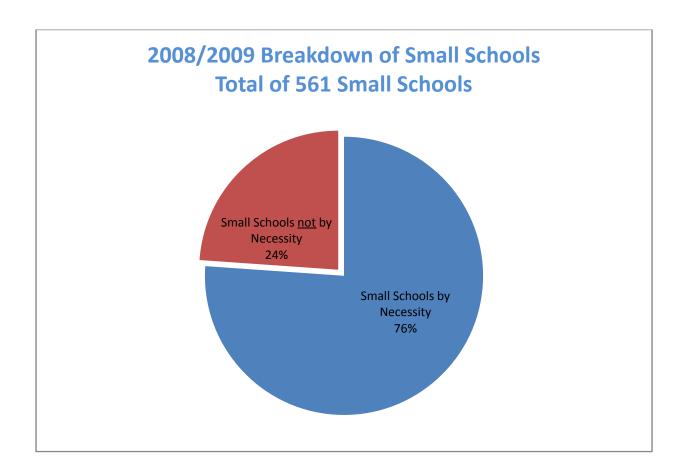
- The 2003/2004 cohort completed in three years in 2005/2006 and in five years in 2007/2008 (the most recent year of results for the 5-year rate). The most recent results (2007/2008) for the 3-year rate are for the 2005/2006 Grade 10 cohort.
- Both the 3-year and the 5-year rates have improved over time.
- Both rates also have leveled off in recent years. The leveling off of the 3-year rate affects 5-year rates in subsequent years.
- Finishing high school is a key indicator that students are well prepared for future success—either in post-secondary programs or the workforce.
- The provincial government has established a 5-year target of 82 per cent for high school completion rate.



DID YOU KNOW...

Grants...

- Stabilization funding was introduced to ensure that no school jurisdiction lost funding under the implementation of the Renewed Funding Framework in 2004/2005. Since the inception of the Framework, grant increases and additional one-time grants have been provided equitably to all school jurisdictions, including those boards receiving Stabilization funding. Currently, 34 school authorities continue to receive approximately \$20.6 million in funding for Stabilization.
- A small school is a school with enrolment fewer than 226 students. A small school is considered to be 'by necessity' if the students cannot be accommodated at a nearby school within the same school jurisdiction, either due to capacity constraints (85 per cent utilization) or distance constraints (25 kilometres in rural areas, 6 kilometres in urban centers).

- To date, government has invested approximately \$951 million in the Class Size Initiative to support the hiring of more than 2,900 teachers. While 79 per cent of school jurisdictions have shown a decrease in K-3 class sizes since the inception of this initiative, 71 percent of jurisdictions continue to have K-3 class size averages greater than the ACOL guideline of 17.
- Jurisdictions have reported challenges in reaching the guidelines in the K-3 area, citing such factors as:
 - Shortage of classroom space;
 - Unanticipated enrolment growth, particularly in the early grades; and
 - Ability to recruit and retain teachers.

Changing Enrolments...

- The Enrolment Growth grant provided to school jurisdictions is intended to help boards address differential costs associated with sharp year-to-year enrolment increases. Funding is provided if year-to-year enrolment growth is greater than 4 per cent at the jurisdiction level and 7 per cent at the school level. New schools qualify for funding under this grant. When a new school opens, it experiences 100 per cent enrolment growth and automatically qualifies for school-level growth funding.
- The Alberta Education Student Population and Teacher Workforce Projection Model is designed to help school planners and administrators engage in informed conversations about future student populations and teacher workforce trends, both at the jurisdiction and provincial levels. By assisting school boards to better anticipate Enrolment Growth, Enrolment Decline, and workforce trends, this useful tool can help boards mitigate associated risks and unexpected cost pressures.



Technology...

- The Intra-Jurisdiction Distance grant to school boards was implemented prior to the
 widespread availability of distance learning technology, and was intended to support school
 boards in operating schools and educating students in more than one community and over
 significant distances.
- Alberta Education has invested in providing technology in classrooms. The Distributed Learning Strategy is designed to provide learning opportunities and choice that transcend the barriers of time and/or location in enabling students' quest for excellence in learning from online and print formats. The Innovative Classrooms grant supports the further integration of key technologies in Alberta's Grade 1 to 12 classrooms. This infusion of technology into the classrooms can help boards to provide educational services in geographically widespread areas.

Mild and Moderate Children...

• Of all funded ECS children in the province, 16.5 per cent are coded as having Mild and Moderate learning disabilities. The percentage of a jurisdiction's coded Mild and Moderate ECS children compared to the jurisdiction's total funded ECS enrolment ranges anywhere from 0 per cent to as high as 61.3 per cent.

High School CEUs...

- In the 2007/2008 school year, approximately:
 - 52 per cent or 77,000 of all high school students, took more than 35 CEUs
 - 32 per cent or 48,000 of all high school students, took more than 40 CEUs
 - 12 per cent or 17,000 of all high school students, took more than 45 CEUs
 - 5 per cent or 7,000 of all high school students, took more than 50 CEUs
 - 2 per cent or 3,000 of all high school students, took more than 55 CEUs
- There is a funding limit of 60 CEUs per student per year. In 2007/2008, funding for approximately 9,000 CEUs was rescinded because these CEUs were earned in excess of the 60 CEU cap per student.



- There is no limit to the number of Work Experience courses a student can take. However, only 15 Work Experience credits count towards a high school diploma.
- In the 2007/2008 school year, 11 per cent of high school students took a Work Experience course, and 8 per cent of high school students were funded for greater than 5 Work Experience CEUs in the year. In some cases, students earned up to 40 CEUs in Work Experience during the year. Successful completion of 40 CEUs requires 1000 hours of work experience instruction.
- In the 2007/2008 school year, 35 per cent of high school students took a Locally Developed Course (LDC) including religion courses, and 7 per cent of high school students were funded for greater than 5 LDC CEUs in the year.

Transportation...

• In the rural setting, 8 per cent of students are bused to a school of choice and 12 per cent of transported students are ineligible for transportation funding. In the urban setting, 12 per cent of students are bused to a school of choice and 19 per cent of transported students are ineligible for transportation funding. In the metro setting, 27 per cent of students are bused to a school of choice and 18 per cent of transported students are ineligible for transportation funding. Busing either ineligible students or busing to a school of choice increases costs to school boards.

Board Expenses...

• According to the 2007/2008 Audited Financial Statements, Board and System Administration expenses make 3.7 per cent of school boards' total expenses on average.

ESL

An Introduction to the ELF Program (English Language Fundamentals)

- 1. **ELF will assist with differentiation and individualized needs**. As a school division we are required to provide appropriate programming for all students. This includes ESL pupils. Teachers in our division do an excellent job of differentiating to meet all these different needs. The intention of the ELF Program to help both the students individually and the classroom instructor with new assistance and skills.
- 2. **SP Ed focus in 2009-2010 help teachers with ESL**. In 2009-2010 one of the focuses for Sp. Ed teachers will assist the classroom teachers with strategies to differentiate instruction where necessary for ESL students. The facilitator is a support to the classroom. She will collaborate with the ESL child's teacher. Together they determine what material the facilitator will preview or review or to teach new during the pull out component to best meet the child's classroom needs.
- 3. **Pull out program depends on individual needs**. How the pull out component will look will depend on the specific needs of your ESL students it may be individual, or it may be small group. The amount of time the ESL child gets will depend on his/her specific needs. Children whose needs are higher will get more pull out time.
- 4. Support will be provided to the facilitators in the form of PD.
 - Facilitators will become familiar with instruments of diagnostics and assessment for ESL students.
 - PD will also help to familiarize facilitators with the 4 levels of proficiency in each of the areas of listening, speaking, reading and writing that ESL students in the English Language Fundamentals (ELF) program encounter.

 Student Services is having all the ESL teachers and facilitators from each school attend 3 ESL workshops this year put on by Southern Alberta PD Consortium (SAPDC).
