

Dear Mr. Grad:

Honourable Jim Prentice, Premier of Alberta, forwarded your September 18, 2014 letter regarding local contributions to modernization projects and, more specifically, the modernization of Monsignor McCoy High School. As Minister of Education, I am pleased to respond on behalf of government.

The Government of Alberta recognizes that schools are hubs of communities and is supportive of partnerships that enhance opportunities for students and communities. On this basis, government is supportive of local funding contributions that complement school facilities beyond established space standards. For example, the City of Lethbridge typically provides additional funding to increase the size of school gymnasiums. Through an established joint-use agreement, the students benefit from the additional space during the school day and the community has access to the gym in the evenings.

I understand that a value scoping study was undertaken in February 2012 with representatives of your school jurisdiction and government. During these discussions the issue of increasing physical education space was raised. At this time, it was indicated that the existing physical activity space meets current space standards but that Monsignor McCoy High School requires modernization to achieve 21st century learning spaces, including reconfiguring instructional areas and addressing deferred maintenance items.

Subsequent to the approval of the modernization in January 2014, it became clear through the design process that increasing the physical education space beyond the space standards remained a priority for Medicine Hat Catholic. Education remains committed to funding the modernization project to meet current designs standards. In order to provide a flexible approach, it has been agreed that the school jurisdiction will contribute \$251,000 in local funding to support the additional space. This amount was established by Infrastructure as a reasonable budget amount for the additional area.

Superintendent's Report to Board

1. **Excellence in Catholic Education Award** – Jill Wilkinson will present the board with information regarding this award. Please note that the application process has been simplified.

2. **Religious Education Advisory Meeting** – Our board work plan indicates the need to set a date for our Religious Education Advisory Meeting.

3. **Bill 202 and Bill 10** – As you know, Liberal MLA Laurie Blakeman, introduced a private member's bill (202) requiring school boards to support Gay Straight Alliance groups in Alberta's schools. Premier Prentice, as a result, indicated he will introduce Bill 10 which will balance the authority of school boards to make decisions related to their operations but which will also provide students who want to form a GSA with a "clear legal recourse if a school attempts to stand in their way". We have contacted Alberta Education for more information but at this time none is available.

Recommendation: Receive as information.

4. Superintendent and Board evaluation for Holy Family Regional Division #37 – I have been asked to lead the evaluation for the Superintendent and Board at Holy Family Regional Division and will be making a presentation to their board in Peace River on December 11. Cost for expenses will be reimbursed to MHCBE. Any honorarium received will be made payable to the Catholic Education Foundation so that it can be donated to the Msgr. McCoy modernization project.

Recommendation: Receive as information.

5. Executive Director and Board evaluation for the Alberta Catholic School Trustees Association —
I have been asked to again lead the evaluation for the Executive Director and Board for the
Alberta Catholic School Trustees Association. As in the past, cost for expenses will be
reimbursed to MHCBE and any honorarium received will be made payable to the Catholic
Education Foundation so it can be donated to the Msgr. McCoy modernization project. This
evaluation will take place in April and May, 2015.



It is intended to create a more streamlined and coordinated approach among the service providers operating with each RCSD region bringing together school authorities, Alberta Health Services (AHS), Human Services (including Child and Family Services, Family Support for Children with Disabilities, and Persons with Developmental Disabilities), and other community organizations and stakeholders so that they can collaborate for the benefit of children, youth and their families. RCSD is a regional model that will support schools and engage community partners in meeting the needs of children and youth throughout the school years – including students (from early childhood services through Grade 12) and children and youth with a low incidence disability or complex need (from birth to age 20).

Continuum of Supports and Services

Individualized: Individualized supports encompass a wide range and varying levels of expertise, as they directly relate to meeting an individual's need. There may also be a need for highly individualized direct supports for specific individuals or groups of children and youth.

Targeted: Targeted supports focus on strategies or interventions for children and youth who need more scaffolded and/or research-based learning opportunities because their needs cannot be addressed through universal supports. Collaborative teaming and problem-solving, as well as specialized expertise, might be required. For example, to fully embrace the diversity, expertise (e.g., Elders, cultural brokers, professionals with expertise in learning disabilities) may be required to work with children and youth who come from different cultures, face poverty issues, or have disability-related needs.

Universal: Universal supports focuses on differentiation and broad-based strategies to benefit all children and youth. Strategies have a system-wide focus. Given the diversity of children and youth, the need for assistance will depend on individual abilities, skills, talents, and personal circumstances. For many children and youth, high-quality programs will be the only assistance that they require (in some areas or domains) to be successful. Universal supports are incorporated into the environment and must be readily available at the outset, versus relying on a 'trigger' (e.g., event, crisis) to access the supports. Universal screening strategies can be the key in the early identification of those who may need specific interventions.

Complex: Complex is defined according to the 'Policy Framework for Children and Youth with Special and Complex Needs' as children and youth that require "significant extraordinary care due to the severity of their impairment(s) and require services from more than one ministry." Those who require such services may include children and youth:

With multiple impairments, complex mental health and health issues and/or severe behavioral needs;

For whom all currently available resources have been utilized with limited success; Who require fiscal and human resources that strain the capacity of any one ministry; For whom there are questions about the safety of the child, youth, family or public.

Low incidence: Low incidence disabilities include: blind/low vision; deaf/hard-of-hearing; deaf-blind; or significant communications disabilities requiring the use of augmented or alternative communication systems.

Background: Catholic school communities place great importance on respect and support for fellow human beings and community mindedness. To this end the CCSSA wish to honour teachers across the Province of Alberta who have contributed in an extraordinary way to serving the needs of Catholic students.

Recommendation /Decision: MHCBE has many teachers who make a real difference in the lives of our Catholic students. Our school jurisdiction may award one certificate to acknowledge their commitment to Catholic education. Criteria have been established by the CCSSA; however the nomination and selection process is to be decided by each school division.

Resulting Action:

- 1. Leadership team provides suggestions for the nomination and selection process
- Administrators reflect on the eligibility requirements criteria to identify individuals to nominate.
- 3. Nomination and selection process will be established and shared with stakeholders.
- 4. Recipient will be chosen

The deadline for providing the CCSSA with the name of the recipient is February 28, 2015. A 300 word summary outlining why the award has been given to the individual and a brief introduction will need to be included with the submission. The CCSSA will then honour the recipient at either SPICE or Blueprints.

Responsibility: Nomination and Selection process will be finalized by senior administration. Leadership team will submit names of nominees. The person nominating the recipient of the award will write a brief summary.

Excellence in Catholic Education Award:

Preparing our youth to grow into outstanding Catholic citizens.

Eligibility

A nominee must be a practicing Catholic and teaching or working full time in a publicly funded Catholic school jurisdiction in the Province of Alberta. The award is limited to individuals who hold a teaching certificate.

Criteria

The selection committee will look for specific examples of how the nominee's character, teaching or leadership excels at:

- Role modeling Catholic values and a Catholic lifestyle;
- Fostering the development of students and their spiritual, intellectual, social, emotional and physical growth;
- Motivating students to exceed their own expectations;
- Attending to individual student needs;
- Working collaboratively with colleagues and parish;
- Demonstrating an in-depth knowledge of subject matter, curriculum, and the integration of the teachings of the Catholic Church;
- Being involved in professional and spiritual growth activities;
- Achieving positive results in student learning
- Demonstrating caring for the well-being of students and colleagues, thereby contributing to a positive school climate

Timeline

Catholicity within our Schools

Students

- Masses: schools began the year with an opening Mass or Thanksgiving Mass held at one of the local churches.
