Dear Parents/Guardians,

Introducing the Eucharistic celebration on March 16, 2020 at Casa Santa Marta, Pope Francis said: "I think of families, closed up, the children not going to school, perhaps the parents cannot go out, and some will be in quarantine." He further added, "[this] is a beautiful opportunity to creatively rediscover true affection in the family. Let us pray for the family so that relationships within the family at this point in time may always flourish for the good. May the Lord help them to find new ways, new expressions of love and shared life in this new situation."

The Coronavirus (COVID-19) is now part of our public and private life and together we must call on faith, hope and courage to meet this challenge. Our *faith* gives us the assurance that we are not alone in times of challenge. *Hope* is our capacity to look beyond the complex challenges of life without being overcome by them. When you brought your children to the Church for baptism, you offered them the greatest gift of all – a share in the eternal life with God. You have thus taken the first responsibility of training your children in cultivating a relationship with God, in living according to his teaching, and in participating in the life of the Church.

The parish community has been blessed to accompany you and your children in this journey, and most recently in the immediate preparation for a fruitful reception of the sacraments of First Reconciliation, First Eucharist or Confirmation.

While it is not possible for us to continue the accompaniment in person at this time, we are fully **committed to** *be* **with you** as you strengthen the domestic church, heeding the words of Pope Francis to seek "new ways, new expressions of love and shared life in this situation." We will support you with pertinent information and resources on a regular basis. Above all, we want to encourage and connect with you.

We look forward to that moment when, once this pandemic has passed, we can gather again as a community of faith to witness your children's celebration of the sacraments with greatest joy and gratitude.
