CHUCK LOVE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The scholarship is available to a deserving student who is currently enrolled in Grade 12 at Monsignor McCoy High School. The sum of the financial allocations must not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) in any one year.

Eligibility:

- 1. Actively involved in student council
- 2. Involved in one or more activities throughout the school besides student council (choir, drama, athletic team, club, etc.)
- 3. Displays a strong character in the classroom, school and the community
- 4. Displays academic perseverance
- 5. Servant leader (leads by doing for others)
- 6. Role model in the classroom, school and the community

Selection of Award Winner:

- 1. Candidate(s) will be proposed by the Principal, or designate, to the Foundation. The student will apply for this scholarship by sending a written request. The application should include background information that would qualify him/her for this award, as well as what they are planning to do for their future career.
- 2. Documents must be submitted to the Foundation no later than September 15th. All applicants will be notified regarding decision by September 30th.

Background:

Chuck and his wife Allyson moved to Medicine Hat in 1980 where Chuck worked as the Vice Principal of St. Mary's and then he became the Vice Principal of McCoy. Chuck worked as the Principal of McCoy; the principal of Mother Teresa and then principal of St Francis Xavier Elementary. Chuck Love enjoyed teaching and coaching. Originally Chuck came from Ontario. He taught English, French and coached Football and Basketball in Thunder Bay. He moved to Yellowknife, NWT where he continued to teach, coach and coordinate programs.

Chuck kept active playing hockey, and swimming every day in the city pools. He was a wonderful role model for his students. He was respected, loved and a true servant leader, in the schools, the Church and in the community. He enjoyed singing and dancing. He was a positive influence since he always looked for the good in everyone. This scholarship is his family's way of carrying on his legacy of Education, Church and Community involvement.
